

BEANIE

Materials:

35 - 40g 8ply acrylic

4mm crochet hook

This beanie is worked as a continuous round. You do not finish the round in the normal manner, just keep going. Place the tail (of the beginning ch) as a marker at the end of each round as you go. You can crochet over the tail and it will not fall out. Good also if you need to pull back a round. Your marker is still there. After completing the beanie just pull out the tail marker and sew it into the first round.



Leaving a 20cm tail (for the marker) make 4ch and sl st together to form a ring.

Round 1. 2ch, 12tr in the ring. Do not count the 2ch as a stitch. (12tr)

Round 2. Miss the 2ch, 2tr in each tr to end. (24tr)

Round 3. * 2tr in next tr, 1tr in next; repeat from * to end. (36tr)

Round 4. * 2tr in next tr, 1tr in each of the next 2tr; repeat from * to end. (48tr)

Round 5. 1tr in each tr with no increases.

Round 6. * 2tr in next tr, 1tr in next 3tr; repeat from * to end. (60tr)

Round 7. * 2tr in next tr, 1tr in next 4tr; repeat from * to end. (72tr)

If a larger beanie is required work a few more extra tr in the next round.
(As a guide there are about 4tr to the inch / 2.5cm.)

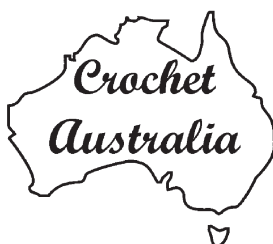
Continue in this fashion (with no more increasing) until beanie measures approx 17cm from round 1, ending the last round with 1htr in next tr, 1dc in next tr.

Work 3 - 4 rounds of dc. The more rounds of dc you work, the tighter the beanie becomes.

Finish with a round of crab st (reverse dc), shells, or other trim if desired.

This pattern can be adapted in size, and other ply yarns (using a needle to suit), by changing the number of increase rows or the length of beanie. Adding dc rounds as stripes and other trims (flowers or hearts etc), and using variegated yarns can make a fun or fashion statement. Sew in all ends.

RELIEF ST BEANIE - Materials: 35 - 40g 8ply acrylic, 4mm crochet hook

Treble Relief Front(trF) is worked: Yoh over hook, hook enters from the front between the last and next treble horizontally and is then brought out between the next and the following treble,(i.e the stitch is worked around the treble post of the treble in the previous round), pulling the stitch to the height of the work yoh, and draw through 2 loops, yoh and draw through the last 2 loops. Treble relief completed. This is sometimes referred to as an around the post stitch.

This beanie is worked as a continuous round. You do not finish the round in the normal manner, just keep going. Place the tail (of the beginning ch) as a marker at the end of each round as you go. You can crochet over the tail and it will not fall out. Good also if you need to pull back a round. Your marker is still there. After completing the beanie just pull out the tail marker and sew it into the first round.

Leaving a 20cm tail (for the marker) make 4ch and sl st together to form a ring.

Round 1. 2ch, 12tr in the ring. Do not count the 2ch as a stitch. (12tr)

Round 2. Miss the 2ch, into each tr work (1tr and tr relief front {trF}) to end
(24sts – 1tr between the posts)

Round 3. *2tr in next tr, 1trF around the next trF; repeat from * to end.
(36 sts – 2tr between the posts)

Round 4. *2tr in next tr, 1tr in next tr, 1trF around the next trF; repeat from * to end.
(48 sts – 3tr between the posts)

Round 5. *2tr in next tr, 1tr in each of the next 2tr, 1trF around the next trF; repeat from * to end.
(60sts – 4tr between the posts)

Round 6. *2tr in next tr, 1tr in each next 3tr, 1trF around the next trF; repeat from * to end.
(72sts- 5tr between the posts)

If a larger beanie is required work a few more extra tr in the next round evenly into the treble sts. As a guide there are about 4tr to the inch / 2.5cm.

Continue in this fashion without any further increases until beanie measures approx. 17cm from round 1, ending the last round 3sts before the relief stitch, with 1tr in next tr, 1dc in next tr.

Work 3 - 4 rounds of dc. The more rounds of dc you work, the tighter the beanie becomes.

Finish with a round of crab st (reverse dc), shells, or other trim if desired.

This pattern can be adapted in size, and other ply yarns (using a needle to suit), by changing the number of increase rows or the length of beanie. Adding dc rounds as stripes and other trims (flowers or hearts etc), and using variegated yarns can make a fun or fashion statement. Sew in all ends.

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
