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PRODUCT OF THE MONTH TATTING

Ok crocheters do not sigh and say we don't do that. Yes there are a lot of clever little tatters out there so from time to time we need to indulge in their interest. We still all use



the same supplies. Tatters just use a needle or shuttle.



Tatting is a centuries old craft, which initially was used in garment making but today we have a variety of patterns for edges, collars, doilies, motifs and baby bonnets and bootees. To make life even easier we have a variety of finished shapes – square, octagonal, round, hearts, diamonds, lotus, clover, flower, star,

petal and oval, all just waiting for these beautiful edges. Yes, you can crochet around them too.

We have tatting books for the beginner, C104 Learn to tat for the left and right handed, a series of little books from Denmark that cover most subjects, Dover books from America, some really good reproduction from Lacis and many more. If you have the internet check them out at http://www.crochetaustralia.com.au/category20 1.htm. For the rest of you we have included a list on page 11.

Shuttles being the tool of trade, we specialise in Clover (the most popular). Aero and Birch with the little hook on the front.

Boye with the extra long nose, Inox and Bohin which must come from the same factory, and the fancy Lacis Victorian shuttles.



Our threads vary for tatting with Klasik #30 being the most popular. For those who prefer the finer threads we have Venus #70 and Dentelles #80 both in a variety of colours. We have combined these threads with some hankies and now have the popular thread / hanky packs. Yes, good for the crocheter too. Of course we have the 10s and 20s in whites and colours and the much finer #80 and #100 in whites and ecru.

So for all the crocheters out there we have put together a Tatting special, too good to miss. Book, thread and shuttle. Come on, give it a go!

Handy Hints



Ever started a crochet pattern, had a few problems and then wondered if it was written in British or America terminology? Well - other than the accent, a quick way to tell American patterns is as follows:

crochet hook size not in metric - eg E/4 instead of 3.50mm thread or yarn used is not recognised - eg worsted weight yarn 8 beginning chain is generally shown as ch8 instead of 8ch; single crochet (sc) may be used (this is our dc) hdc (half double crochet) used instead of htr (half treble)

If still unsure, the actual pattern instructions may provide a clue such as the number of turning chain used with a particular stitch.
