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BITS and PIECES (not necessarily crochet)

- these start at 25mm for those tiny projects. Fabric stiffer to stiffen the bells and baskets and awls to help with holes. Not to mention Christmas tea towels and tea towels to cut in





half and crochet. Face washers for kiddies and ladies, tatting shuttles of many styles and hair pin frames. Add a few knitting needles, gauges and pouches and sprinkle in some butterfly looms, daisy wheels and

flower looms. Porcelain half dolls, plastic bed and cupie dolls and doll stands. Add a hanky or two and lots of different styles of daylight lights. Traced linen as tablecloths and doilies and stranded cottons. Not to mention quick unpicks and knitting nancys,





bead spinners and beads, doodle looms and knit wits and magnetic boards, eyes noses and paws.

As you see not a lot of crochet amongst this lot, but all necessary to the cause. We all love nick knacks and they make our world a little more interesting.

Handy Hints





When doing Tricot work (Afghan Crochet/Tunisian Crochet) use a hook about one and a half or two sizes larger than you would usually use for normal crochet using the same yarn otherwise the finished work will be too small and very tight. Thank you for sending the hankies, but you will never believe that I have lost them. 




This new section in the newsletter will provide a glimpse of some of the new and interesting things we have discovered during the month.









How cute is this!! Crocheted Poncho and Hat for your favourite pooch in 6 sizes from extra small to 2 x extra large. From the book 875551 Doggie Divas & Dandies (\$15.35).





ASN1261 Crochet Blessings (\$17.95) contains not only the expected designs with crosses, it also contains some unusual edges including the lambs and doves as shown. These edges are from 7.5 to 9cm (3 - 3.5") deep and use #10 crochet cotton.
