
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Potatoes

Types of Crochet

There are many styles of crochet that exist, and because you already have the basic skill, with practice you are able to learn new concepts with ease. This is the beauty of crochet, same stitches, just used in a different method. Some require a different hook, like Tunisian or Crochet-on-the-double and others like Hairpin require an additional tool known as a staple and broomstick that uses a large knitting needle as a loom. Other than that your crochet hook is the primary tool.

This month we will follow through with a few favourites.

- 1. Broomstick crochet / jiffy / lattice loop or peacock eye is worked over a large knitting needle or dowel and the size of the tubular device used determines the greatness of the loop formed. Used to make beautiful airy shawls, and flowing garments.
- 2. Bavarian crochet also known as Catherine wheel crochet has been with us for a long time and is used for doilies, garments, pillows and rugs. Bavarian crochet uses a two round stitch technique combining shells and clusters with a post stitch.
- 3. Crochenit / On-the-double combines the art of crochet and knitting with one double ended hook. As with Tunisian, this is similar but the fabric is reversible. Quick and easy to do and lots of different stitch combinations to follow. Patterns are available for lots of household items with the most popular being rugs.
- 4. In Bruges lace, long strips of short rows are made and connected as they are worked. The strips, usually referred to as tapes or ribbons, may be connected to chain spaces on previous rows to make turns, waves, circles, arches and curves for a serpentine appearance. Bruges is great for doilies and clothing alike.
- 5. Celtic Crochet / lace is a combination of the crochet and weave technique. The motifs are crocheted separately, usually in various colour combinations, then woven and finished off with a crocheted round that holds the piece together. These can be reversible and reminiscent of rich Celtic traditions. From Celtic crochet you can create beautiful afghans.
- 6. Hairpin lace, Maltese Lace and Portuguese lace are all the same. The description is from Wikipedia Hairpin lace is formed by wrapping yarn around the prongs of the hairpin lace loom to form loops, which are held together by a row of crochet stitched worked in the center, called the spine. The resulting piece of lace can be worked to any length desired by removing the bottom bar of the hairpin and slipping the loops off the end. The strips produced by this process can be joined together to create an airy and lightweight fabric. Various types of yarns and threads can be used to achieve different color, texture and design effects. Examples of items made with hairpin lace include scarves, shawls, hats, baby blankets, afghans, and clothing. Hairpin lace can also be added to sewn, knitted, and crocheted items as a decorative accent.
- 7. Rag Crochet uses strips of fabric and usually a large hook to crochet the strips. The great thing about this is that we can finally use up all that fabric we have hoarded for years. Combine scraps and perhaps use some that you have recycled. Great for bags, floor mats, items of jewellery, kitchen mats and trendy hats.
- 8. Interlocking Crochet is sometimes referred to as double filet, intermeshing or interweave crochet. It is a technique where 2 layers of filet mesh are worked simultaneously and interlocked together to create a reversible fabric. The geometric designs that this stitch can create, combined with different colour combinations, is perfect for rugs and garments. There are over 80 stitch designs.


