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### Cozy Claws - feet and hands

They always say that 'if your hands or feet are cold the rest of you is cold'. In my case it is definitely true, and I've spent many a day crocheting socks and slippers, gloves and mittens to keep them warm — for myself and others. This cool weather is the perfect

time for making them. If you are traveling they are the perfect thing to take - as a finished item or a WIP during travel.



Better still, you don't always need the fine yarns for making



socks. Many patterns exist for socks made from 4ply or 8ply yarn, keeping you cozy, and slippers and gloves are warm when using 8ply or thicker yarn.

As these are small projects, they are reasonably quick to create, and make great gifts. Of course they are not just for the warm weather - lacy

gloves can bring a touch of elegance to an outfit and cotton socks are also great in warmer weather.

The shops of course are full of machine-made socks, slippers and gloves. But making them yourself means you have more choice for your colour, style and pattern - some of which you can't buy in the shops.

Many new patterns have given the traditional booties and gloves

a boost. Why not try leg warmers (coming back into fashion) or wrist warmers (the new fashion accessory).

For the tatters and embroiderers a touch of elegance can be added to handmade or bought



gloves, by the addition of decorative edges. We hope you find something suitable in our collection of patterns and accessories to keep your feet and hands warm. Try this months free pattern for fingerless gloves.



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# Tip of the Month Yarn Weight/Ply



Several questions have come our way regarding yarn weight/ply. Many of the patterns are written in other countries and invariably use a different measure for yarn weight than what we do in Australia. Additionally the term ply has different meaning in the USA (meaning the number of strands that are twisted together) than in Australia., where we use it to refer to the thickness of the yarn.

A number of tables exist explaining the relationship that exists - the most comprehensive one I've found is included in Yarn magazine. However it is copyright and cannot be reprinted here. Instead, I have included below the yarn classification sourced from the Craft Yarn Council of America [www.craftyarncouncil.com] and what this means [referring to Ravelry and Nancy's Knit Knacks]. They have also introduced a new 7 weight category within the past year. Note that this table doesn't include the threads finer than 10, which have their own classification.

The above is only a guide and some types of yarn are included in more than one category. Additionally, there is some variation between manufacturers as to how they classify their yarn. For example, many patterns call for worsted yarn which could be a size 3 or 4 yarn. What is most important is to take time to do a gauge swatch for the project and adjust accordingly.

I often use 8ply yarn when a pattern calls for yarn category 4 or worsted weight yarn and adjust my tension/stitches based on the gauge swatch.
