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


Theme of the Month—Granny Squares – they're not just for **Grannies!**

When I say I am making items out of granny square, I get one of two reactions from people - 'oh that is so old fashioned' or 'that is

so chic'. Of course they are both right! Granny squares have been around a very long time, but are making a revival. Gigi Hadid, US fashion model, has been seen in the streets of New York and Paris in a granny square jacket creating the desire for this new look (even though it was referred to as 'knitting' in one news report).





The thing I love about Granny Squares is the variety available. Generally they all begin at the centre and use various combinations of treble and chains to create interesting looks. There are many stitch directories around to help create interesting granny squares. And you can use your imagination

to create your own designs. Of course they don't have to be square – circles, triangles and hexagons all count—hence we also often hear the term motifs instead of granny squares.



They are also a great way of using up

remnants and scraps of yarn and bring colour to projects. Any yarn



can be used - bulky, worsted weight or thread. We've featured a few of the books available in the following pages.

The projects available to be made are endless. From small wrist warmers, cup

cozies and slippers, to bags, clothing and accessories or pillows and

afghans. Why not try decorative wall hangings, toys or even dog-coats.

Try making these granny square slippers for a child or lady.

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Tip of the Month Granny Square Success



I learnt to make granny squares many years ago with the traditional chain centre, finishing off at each colour round and use a slip stitch to join the new colour – and if you weren't changing to a new colour slip stitch to the chain space to begin your next row. Fast forward to today and there are a number of new techniques for each of these steps that make it far easier to construct a granny square. Many of the books on granny squares will take you through these new techniques as well as the basics of making a granny square. These techniques themselves are universal once learnt and can be used in many other projects where you begin with a circle – eg amigurumi, beanies – when changing colours and where you need to begin the next row in the middle of a chain space and not where you end the row. I've outlined below three techniques I've learnt that replace the traditional techniques I learnt as a youngster. I hope you find them useful for all your projects.

The magic ring (also called the adjustable ring). Rather than beginning with a series of chains turned into a circle with a slip stitch, begin with a magic ring. The magic ring begins with no chains and can be made as big or as small as needed. If you can make a slip knot to begin your crochet, then you can make the magic ring. Begin to make a slip knot, and rather than tightening the knot, keep it loose, and pinch the yarn so that it fits around the hook and begin your beginning chain for the first row – eg 3 if using trebles in the circle. Then crochet the number of stitches for the first row into the big circle of the slip knot. At the end of the row, pull the tail of the yarn to tighten up the circle to the desired size, or you can stretch and 'grow' the circle as you crochet your first row if needed, then pull the centre tight.









Standing stitches. Instead of beginning each new colour row with beginning chains, create your first stitch from 'midair', whether it be a double crochet, treble, half-treble or double treble. Begin with a slip knot on your hook and begin your stitch – eg if making a double crochet, insert your hook in the designated stitch, pull up a loop, yarn over hook and pull through the two loops on the hook, and if making a treble, wrap the yarn around the hook and then insert hook through the designated stitch.

When you wrap the yarn around the hook before inserting it into the designated stitch you may need to use your fingers to hold the slip stitch and yarn over in place until you complete the stitch. Begin each new colour row in a different chain space from where you ended the previous colour.







Ending round with a stitch. When you are not changing colours, the general rule is to end the round by the specified number of chain then a slip stitch to the first stitch of the round. This leaves your hook above that first stitch. However, when making granny squares, you want to begin the next round in the chain space between the three trebles, and therefore have to stich over the trebles to get to the next chain space, or turn your work

and slip stitch back to the previous chain space. Try finishing your round by substituting a stitch into the first stitch of the round, rather than the specified number of chain. If you are using 1-chain spaces, substitute this with a double crochet; if you are using 2-chain spaces, substitute this with a half treble; if you are using 3-chain spaces, substitute this with a treble. This will leave your hook in the middle of the chain space ready to begin your next round. The first 3 treble grouping is then made over the stitch just made.



The invisible join. I was taught to finish off on a round with a slip stitch to the beginning stitch, cut the yarn and then pull through the final loop on hook. This can often leave a bump. With the invisible join you avoid the bump. When you complete the last stitch, take the loop off the hook before joining to the beginning of the round. Using your hook or a needle thread the yarn up through the loop, then through the top of the second stitch of the row (back to the front) and then through the top of the loop on the hook and out the back. Pull the yarn gently to tighten up the stitch, and weave in the end.







Even if your patterns don't describe these techniques, you can substitute them to make it easier to create your granny squares and other projects
