Theme—Tatting

Tatting is a technique for handcrafting lace formed by a series of rings and chains over a core thread. Gaps can be left between the stitches to form picots, which are used for practical construction as well as



decorative effect. Tatting dates back to the early 19th century.

Tatting can be used to make lace edging, doilies, table cloths, collars, accessories such as earrings and necklaces, and other decorative pieces. It is a very portable project as few tools are needed – a shuttle or needle, scissors and thread – although there are also other useful tools.




Shuttles can be made from various material – plastic, wood, abalone shell, bone or metal. Here at crochet Australia we stock plastic and metal shuttles. They can come with built in points or hooks – useful for guiding

thread when joining – or without tips—where use of the mini hooks or crochet hooks come in handy. When winding thread, you can either wind directly onto the shuttles – meaning you will need to have several shuttles if using colour – or onto bobbins that fit into the shuttles.

Needle tatting has also become popular and can give the same beautiful lacy look. A more modern variation is In the last month I've had many enquiries about tatting cro-tatting which combines crochet and tatting to create a similar look.

The highest quality thread to use for tatting is a 6-cord cordonet. The Lizbeth thread is a 6-cord cordonet in 4 thicknesses that suit the beginner to the experienced tatter. And with other 130 colours there is something for everyone. Other threads that can also be used include Fincrochet cotton, DMC babylo or even DMC Perle cottons.

Tip of the Month— Tatting



Thank you to Val D for providing these tips she's picked up from her own experiences and advice from others.

- 1. The double stitch is the most important stitch to perfect as it is used throughout most patterns.
- 2. Be prepared for it to take time to learn it properly and advance. It is not something that you will pick up over night and you may find it very slow going at first.
- 3. When doing rings, do count all doubles before you close the ring as it is difficult to undo once the ring is closed.
- 4. Always ensure your hands are clean before starting don't apply hand cream before working on your project, as this will soil your item.
- 5. When using multiple shuttles it is best to have different colours so that is easier to recognise them.
- 6. If using multiple colours, it is essential to know the reef knot.
- 7. When reading German pattern books be aware that they work left to right whereas other books work right to left.
- 8. Reversing your work is not the same as turning your work, and it is important to understand the difference.
- 9. There is a right way to wrap the thread around your fingers to ensure the running thread and shuttle thread aren't confused. Take time to learn this.
- 10. You don't have to use the size thread stated in the pattern. You can use a different size thread which will give a different finished size to your project. See the samples below—same pattern with three different size threads










Book of the Month





HHT19 The Complete Book of Tatting \$51.50 ** Very Heavy

(Lacis revised edition of the 1995 edition) By Rebecca Jones. Everything you wanted to know but couldn't find out about shuttle lace. I have heard this book being refered to by tatting teachers as the tatter's bible. After peering through the 112 pages of information I can see why. You are acquainted with threads, shuttles, history, how to tat and all it involves, from the very beginning including 6 different methods including needle tatting. There are simple starter patterns, working with combinations of 1 and 2 threads and shuttles, Josephine knots, motifs, ric rac tatting, lock stitch, rings, beads, cluny tatting, roll tatting, edges, notepaper, butterflies, doodles, baskets, jewellery, Christmas, alphabets and numbers, bits for babies, cats, bugs and a lot more. 112 pages.

Red one is No 12 in book - Pineapple Wheel done in No 10 cotton

Blue one is No 13 in book - Peacock Pride done in No 20 cotton White one is No 15 in book - Perfect Pineapple done in No 40 cotton
